

CONNECTION:

We hope that today's space offers the space and time to connect with new people and organizations, as well as the opportunity to strengthen ties with the people and groups that you are already in relationship with. We invite you to check out the list of organizations and groups that are in space today and we invite you to formally connect with others in the morning networking space and over lunch. As with our Spring convening with Dr. Robin Wall Kimmerer, we hope that today's agenda facilitates a space that supports a deepening sense of belonging and relationship - with one another as well as with oneself.

LEARNING:

Inspiration for much of the day's agenda came from Maurice Mitchell's article, "Building Resilient Organizations", as well as subsequent writings from others in conversation with the piece. We designed the day considering how to connect groups to one another - across their projects or programs, as well as to some of lineages of movement and community work that can offer frameworks, learnings, and tools to the work of community groups and leaders today. We hope that the practices, knowledge and tools offered by today's speakers and workshop leaders support the work of attendees in building and strengthening effective and transformative campaigns, organizations, partnerships & coalitions.

66 This moment is one of multiple, overlapping crises: a global pandemic, rising authoritarianism, climate emergency, political violence, unprecedented economic inequality, and general precarity all exacerbate interpersonal tension points. CO-FOUNDER BLACK PANTHER PARTY - SEATTLE

his father took a job at Boeing. Dixon grew up in Seattle's Central District, attending Garfield High School. While at Garfield High, Dixon helped organize the school's Black Student Union in 1968. That same year, with his older brother Aaron Dixon, he co-founded the Seattle Chapter of the Black Panther Party. He served the Chapter as its Field Marshall as well as the Breakfast Program Coordinator. When the Seattle Chapter closed its office and some of its core members moved to Oakland in 1972, Elmer, under parole and unable to move to Oakland, stayed in Seattle and reorganized the Chapter. He worked to sustain the Party's breakfast program and health clinic, maintaining the Panther organization until 1976 and some programs into the 1980s. Elmer Dixon now works as a diversity consultant.

Yomara began organizing as a young single mother in the mid-90s, fighting for women on welfare to gain access to higher education.

Yomara spent the first phase of her career organizing in the South Bronx with organizations fighting for educational justice, tenant rights, affordable housing, policing, and environmental justice. In 2002, Yomara founded Sistas on the Rise in the South Bronx. This youth-led, young mother's collective created a new model of organizing grounded in transformative practices. After founding Sistas on the Rise, Yomara moved to Atlanta, Georgia, where she spent 7 years organizing in the South with organizations such as 9to5: National Association of Working Women and the Georgia Latino Alliance for Human Rights.

She served on SisterSong Women of Color Reproductive Justice Collective's board of directors and on the Feminist Health Center's Latinas' Initiative. For the last 10 years, Yomara led organizing initiatives at the National Domestic Workers Alliance, building their chapter structure and managing all of the state organizing campaigns. Specifically, she supported affiliates with organizing campaigns to win domestic workers' bill of rights in states across the country.

I am a researcher, facilitator, sound therapist, and artist working in service of people and planet.

I toured the world as an indie rock musician in 2008 with a band on Hardly Art (a subsidiary of Sub Pop). Later that year I moved to Seattle to work as a program assistant teaching Seattle civil rights history through conversation, film, music, art, and dance. Within a decade I became the executive director of two non-profits in Seattle. I played key roles in passing several policies and implementing programs that improved working conditions for millions of workers and advanced environmental justice principles in Washington state.

In the past decade, I've raised more than 20 million dollars to support organizations that support workers rights, leadership development and training programs, environmental justice, and equitable community development projects. I was recognized by the City of Seattle for my work to advance civil rights and was named one of the 15 people who should run Seattle.

I have a B.A. in Public Policy and Anthropology from William and Mary, and a master's in Social Work from the University of Washington with a focus on community centered integrative practice. I have been a musician for three decades and have spent 15 years learning and practicing meditation, sound healing, intuitive coaching, facilitation, and more.

LOVING ROOM: diaspora books + salon is a Black-owned community reading room (bookstore + cultural salon) featuring various genres of literature by Black + African writers for readers of all ages. We curate a selection of new and used reading material from U.S.born Black authors, as well as African, Caribbean, and other Diaspora writers to be read on-site. We also have a variety of new titles available for purchase. Our collection includes Children's and Young Adult literature, as well as a vast and varied selection of Fiction and Non-Fiction works from Black writers past and present. We aspire to cultivate a space for collective Black ancestral healing and transformation through a commitment to Black literature and African Diasporic decolonial aesthetics.

Our public programs will include a weekly children's story hour, youth readaloud, and young writers' club, while our monthly offerings will consist of our teens' book club, grown folks' book club, poetry soirées, film screenings, and more. We seek to cultivate a space of welcome and connection for Black readers of all ages, and to reclaim thriving Black cultural space in the historic Central District.

Remaining present and in alignment with these intentions, we welcome collaboration with Black creatives across all genres— authors, poets, visual artists, musicians, playwrights, and other performance artists.
